Grade 5 - Lesson 2

Navigates Internet independently/safely; teach others how to perform common web-based tasks

The two browsers that are functional on Intel-based Macintosh computers are SafariTM and FirefoxTM. Both of these browsers also work on Windows XPTM and VistaTM computers. On PCs, Internet Explorer 6 or 7 can be used. All three web browsers work in much the same way. This should be made known to students: Whatever tasks they can do using the computers at school can be done nearly the same way on computers they might use at home or the public library.

For the purpose of this lesson, the teacher will choose a site relevant to a topic being studied in class, such as fossils, Native Americans, the Civil Rights Movement, etc.... Or, conversely, the teacher leads a lesson on a topic, and the skills below are embedded in the lesson. Skills students should be able to perform:

- Opening the designated web browser (this is important because some sites are optimized for use with particular browsers, or just work a lot better with one rather than another)
- Replacing the current page address with one that is called for
- Going to a page that is listed in a 'Favorites' menu, or Bookmark bar
- Adding a page to Favorites or Bookmarks bar
- Resize, move, minimize a browser window
- Resize text in a window to make it larger and easier to read
- Click on a designated link and go to another page
- Perform a simple search for text on a particular page
